# NEW ZEALAND FLAG DEBATE

# Introduction

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In the past, New Zealand has changed our flag 3 times. In the past few years parliament has brought it up in discussions but nothing has been done until now. Many New Zealanders want a change and many New Zealanders don't.

## History of our current flag

Our current flag is very similar to Australia's flag. The stars on our flag represent the Southern Cross which you can see from New Zealand. The Union Jack on our flag represents our connections in the past and present with Britain. The royal blue background represents the seas that we are surrounded by. This flag was elected to be our national flag in 1902. Before then, there have only been two other flags before the current one.

## Arguments for changing the flag

There are three official languages in New Zealand; English, Sign-language and Maori. 15% of New Zealand's population is Maori and it is a big part of our culture yet there is absolutely no representation of it in our current flag at all!

Many people want to see the silver fern make an appearance on the flag. The fern shows up on many of our sports team's uniforms, such as the All Blacks, Silver Ferns, Black Caps and even our America's Cup team. The silver fern is our most representative symbol, yet it doesn't appear on our current flag at all.

# Arguments for not changing the flag

Some arguments against changing the flag;

Changing the flag costs a lot of money. The campaign has cost over 26 million dollars already and that is just deciding whether to change the flag or not. If we do change the flag it will cost millions more to actually change all the flags around the country.

People also argue that the flag shouldn't be changed as it has been through World War 1 and World War 2 and the soldiers all fought for our country when this flag was flying. 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
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## How does the referendum process work?

The referendum process started with New Zealander's saying what they wanted to stand for and what they wanted in their flag. After those comments were submitted any-one could submit a flag design that they thought would be worthy of being our national icon. Almost 10 000 designs were submitted by July 16<sup>th</sup>. From there a panel of twelve supreme New Zealanders will choose from all those designs and will pick their top four. The vote will then be handed to the New Zealand public on which of those four is the best. In March 2016 New Zealand will then vote against whether they want that chosen flag to be the official flag or whether we stay will the current flag.
