


<u>Population</u>

Apart from Buddhism and Shintoism there are other religions in Japan that has been, for example; Christianity, Mormon, Jehovah's Witnesses e.t.c.




Japanese Life Expectancy

Like on the table women has the highest life expectancy with 87.32 years and men having 81.25 years.








Currency


Kimono & Yukata

Temples in Japan are places to worship Buddha.

Hiragana, Katakana and Kanji.





- 5. Iron, steel: (4.1%)
- 6. Plastics, plastic articles: (3.5%)
- 7. Organic chemicals: (2.6%)
- 8. Mineral fuels including oil: (1.8%)
- 9. Ships, boats: (1.7%)
- 10. Gems, precious metals: (1.6%)
